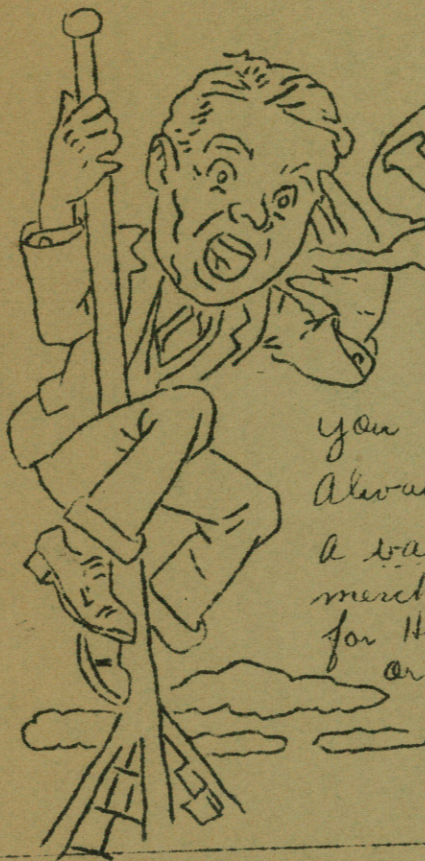

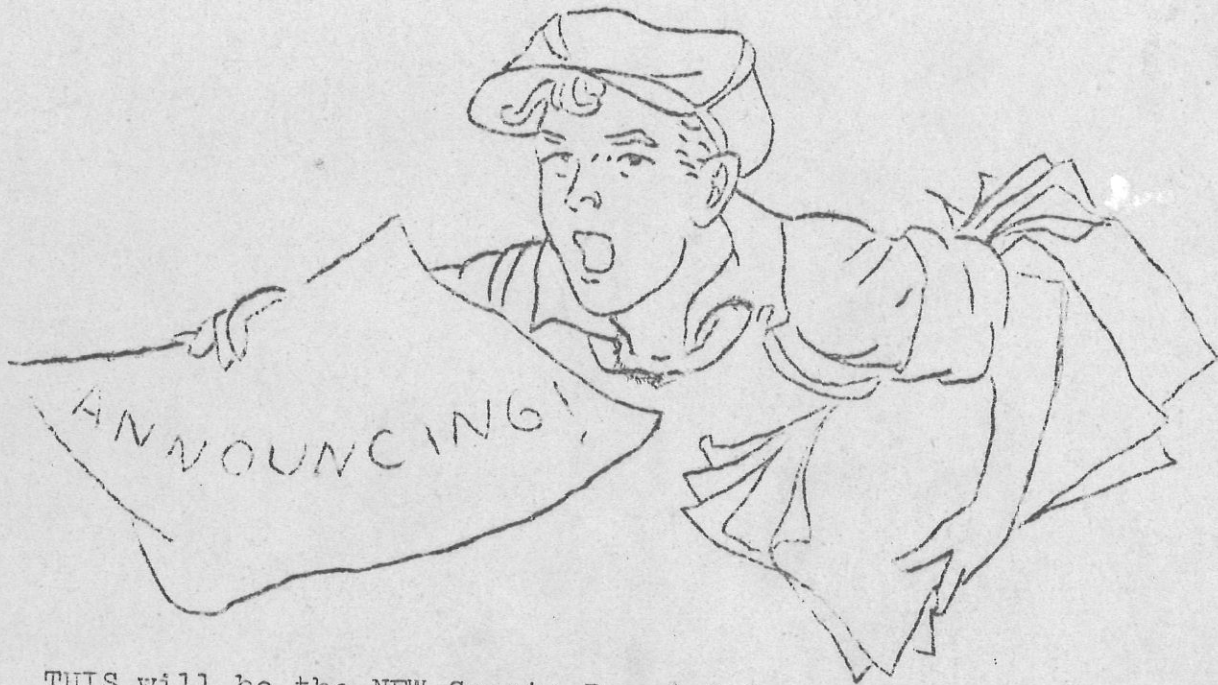

**HORNETS STING ANTELOPES 61-0**

Everyone who wore a suit took part in the game last night on Harmon Field, where the Hornets defeated Abernathy Antelopes 61-0. The mentionable thing about this score is that several of the touchdowns were made by second string men; while secondly a brick wall was provided by yellow-jacket men who held back the opponents as if they were accustomed to such games.

Abernathy kicked off to Hornets, and the ball was carried by Jim Eddins to the 20 yard line. From there Waymon Bellar carried the ball around the right end up to the Antelope 43 yard line. Jim Eddins succeeded in making a first down prior to a five yard penalty for his team. This, however, was no hindrance to the Hornet team, for the ball went to Waymon, and like a modern Marvel Man, he ran the remaining yards to the goal line for the first touchdown in the game. Extra point was not reached.

Hornets then kicked to Antelopes who tried a short over-line pass and made the kick good for about seven or eight yards. Forced to kick, they lost the ball to Hornets who received on the 20 yard line;

Ralph May, going around the left end, picked up about eight yards. Jim Eddins made a second first

down. Again Waymon received and with cheers and shouts from the spectators splitting the cool November air, he ran some 18 or 19 yards. From there Bill Tucker moved up 11 or 12 yards. Jim passed to Waymon who made it good for about seven yards. A substitute was pulled out for the Antelope team when one on field was hurt.

Jim passed to Connie Hill, who moved up to the 11 yard line. Here a fumble gave Antelopes the ball. Antelopes, however, lost ground and were forced to kick. Waymon took the ball and went over again for the second touchdown in the game. Bill Baker kicked for the extra point and set the score at 13-0.

At the beginning of the second quarter Sudan got a 15 yard penalty. Jim passed to Waymon, who amid a mad scramble in which he lost his helmet, struggled on up the field until he was pulled down on the 19 yard line. Ralph carried the ball to the first yard line, where Hornets called time out. Ralph went through the center for the third touchdown. Extra point was good.

Hornets kicked to Abernathy but the ball went out of bounds, and Hornets kicked again. This kick sent the ball over the goal line and the Abernathy man stood trans-

ized and just stood there look-  
ing at the ball, while Ralph May  
ran up and covered for another  
touchdown for the Hornets. Extra  
point was good, making the score  
27-0.

Antelopes received the kick from  
Hornets on their 35 yard line. Af-  
ter making unsuccessful downs of  
three, they were forced to kick,  
and Sudan got the ball on their  
40 yard line. Hornets seemed to be  
slowing down when they kicked and  
Abernathy received on their 22  
yard line. By an intercepted pass  
by Kelton Doty, Hornets made an-  
other touchdown and the score was  
set at 34-0.

Hornets kicked to Abernathy,  
and they got the ball on their  
45 yard line. However, they were  
not able to bridge the Hornet line  
and kicked. Abernathy kicked ag-  
ain, for red flaga went down on  
the play. This time the ball was  
received on Hornet 31 yard line,  
and Jim Eddins passed to Waymon  
who carried to the Abernathy 15  
yard line, and that marked the  
half with a score of 34-0.

At the half the pep squad mar-  
ched on Harmon Field, forming an  
"A" and an arrow which pointed  
toward their goal. Leading the  
squad was little Tommie Suzette  
Walker, mascot, and the four lead-  
ers and sponsor--Ann Pennington,  
Mutt Lane, Joy Hanna, Leta Vin-  
cent and Mr. B. Wallace.

Hornets kicked off to Antelopes  
and they got the ball to their  
18 yard line but dropped the ball  
which was covered by Leroy M.

Ralph took the ball and went  
up the 10 yard line. This time  
the ball goes to Jim E. and he  
went over again for another touch-  
down for the Hornets. The extra  
point was good.

The ball was received by the  
Antelopes on their 20 yard line.  
The ball went over the goal line  
on another kick, but this time the  
Abernathy man covered. The ball  
came back the 20 yard line. Soon  
Connie was able to cover for the  
Hornets and the Antelopes were  
again left without a score.

At this point the second string

went aboard the field. The main  
string went to the dressing-room,  
dressed, and came back to watch  
the rest of the game.

Theron Hill took the ball to  
the fourth yard line. Theron has  
not been playing football for  
sometime now because of a knocked  
down shoulder which he received  
in practice early in the season.  
Ralph went over again for a touch-  
down and the extra point was good.

Abernathy received the ball  
on their 30 yard line, and seem-  
ing not to be able to hold, they  
lost the ball when Ralph covered.  
Kelton then goes up 11 or 12  
yards. Kelton was playing the po-  
sition of Joe Price, who was in-  
jured in practice.

Bill Tucker tried to get a  
pass to Denzel Wiseman but Aber-  
nathy covered him before he got  
the ball. After several plays in  
which the second string show a  
true spirit of Hornet ideals, Ther-  
on Hill made another touchdown,  
and the score was set at 54-0.

Abernathy got the ball on their  
30 yard line, and their attempt-  
ed pass was intercepted by Ra-  
mon Lowe, who made another touch-  
down and the score was set at 61-  
0.

From there the yellow-jersey  
men and some of the second string  
held the Antelopes back and held  
the line for Hornet High.

Complete scores were: Hornets,  
nine touchdowns; seven extra  
points; 13 first downs; seven  
passes; three completed passes;  
three intercepted passes; three  
penetrations; eight penalties.  
Antelopes, no touchdowns; five  
first downs; seven passes; one  
completed pass; two penetrations;  
two penalties.

Touchdowns were made by Way-  
mon Bellar, two; Ralph May, three;  
Jim Eddins, one; Theron Hill, one;  
and Ramon Lowe, one. Bill Baker  
kicked five extra points, while  
Theron Hill kicked two.
